Tamil Nadu, Chennai, February 15 – The Good Shepherd Convent in Nungambakkam, a beacon of service and compassion since 1924, marked its centenary with grandeur and splendor. Committed to uplifting lives, the congregation expanded its mission to India in 1854 and established its first convent in Chennai in 1924. Guided by the founder’s profound belief that “One person is more precious than the whole world,” the congregation has devoted itself to transforming lives, reflecting her vision through a century of steadfast service and dedication.

Dr. B.R. Ambedkar says – “I measure the progress of a community by the degree of progress that women have achieved.”

During a time when the call for women’s liberation and emancipation was growing louder, leaders passionately advocated for women’s education, property rights, gender equality, and the abolition of dowry oppression. Poets, too, played their part, using their words to raise awareness and inspire change. In the midst of this transformative period, the sisters of the Good Shepherd Congregation began their mission of selfless service. They dedicated themselves to the empowerment of vulnerable women, offering support and guidance when they faced challenges and hardships in a conflicted society.

The Marian Home, a sanctuary for countless oppressed women, was established by the congregation with the noble mission of offering refuge and protection to those most in need. It opened its doors to women abandoned by their families, those stranded in confusion at bus stands and railway stations, children of single parents, survivors of suicide attempts, and those living in marginalized communities. It also served as a safe haven for women denied education, victims of human trafficking, and women hailing from the rural villages of Tamil Nadu. Through its undaunted commitment, the Marian Home has become a symbol of safety, empowerment, and a new beginning for those facing life’s deepest struggles.

The sisters of the Good Shepherd Congregation provided the children who sought refuge under their care with not only quality education but also essential life skills. They ensured that these children had access to formal education, vocational training in handicrafts, martial arts, certified tailoring, cooking, and gardening, as well as professional courses in teacher training, nursing, diploma programs, and undergraduate and postgraduate degrees, equipping them with the finest education they aspired to pursue. The impact of this noble mission extends far beyond India, as the women who once studied within these sacred walls have gone on to make their mark across the globe. Alongside academic excellence, the sisters instilled in their students profound values of compassion, humanity, environmental conservation, and patriotism, shaping them into responsible and empowered individuals.

The Mottukal initiative, the next phase of the congregation's tireless dedication to social cause, was originally established as Priyavanam in 1970. This remarkable endeavor extended its compassionate care to the most vulnerable infants. These tiny dots have felt the warmth of a mother's love through their dedicated care. The sisters provided them with the necessary resources to pursue their education from primary to higher studies without any hindrance. Beyond academics, they nurtured courage, self-reflection, brotherhood, and self-reliance within these children, empowering them to face life's challenges with resilience and confidence, even in the face of adversity.

The Homecoming Celebration, held on Saturday as part of the centenary celebrations, honored the legacy of the Good Shepherd Congregation's profound social service. Mrs. Shobana Thomas, Deputy Secretary of Children Home of Hope, Maduravoyal, was the Chief guest who graced the occasion, while Sr Pushpa Louis, province leader, Good Shepherd Congregation, Central East India-Nepal Province, was the guest of honor. CWC Chairperson Mr. Rajkumar, Inspector of Nungambakkam Police Station Mr. Karunakaran, and Auditor Dr. Kandasamy, attended as special invitees.
