One child bride is way too many child brides. Society must accept that children are children. Care for the future and happiness of each child. Respect our rights not only as the investment of tomorrow's world, but because we are just as human as adults are and we have all the rights to all the virtues the world has to offer.

The forum, as said by Sister Winifred is not a political debate, is a platform where we elevate the issues faced by girls around the world, a safe space where we can discuss, spread awareness, empower and be educated.
